## Making sure you have the right medication at one of the first points of care

The Lord Carter report highlighted the need for ambulance services to take advantage of digital innovation and technology. The report recommended that there should be an increase in patients treated at the scene of an emergency to create savings and reduce pressures on A&E wards. Omnicell automated dispensing systems can help do this by allowing frontline staff to easily access medication so that they can restock their medication pouches/kits. This frees up staff time, helps the ambulance service make significant financial savings and ensures that staff have the right dose of the right medication at the scene of an emergency.



# Here are some key issues that Omnicell's automated solutions can help ambulance services to overcome:

#### Drug administration

Omnicell automated cabinets can help ensure staff have access to the right dose of the right medication. This means when staff arrive at an emergency scene they have the correct medication and there will be no delays in administering medication to patients.

#### Lack of medication audit trail

Omnicell automated cabinets can provide a full audit trail and record of who removed the medication, when and for which patient, providing staff with reassurance that nothing can go missing.

#### Missing keys

Staff can access the cabinets via a passcode and fingerprint technology. This means reducing staff time spent looking for drug cupboard keys or stock. This time can be returned back to patient care.

#### Stock levels

Better management of stock levels helps reduce the risk of expired drugs.

### Controlled drugs registers

With Omnicell automated dispensing cabinets a CD count can be done on a weekly basis saving a significant amount of staff time allowing for a paperless system.

#### Patient experience

Ensuring frontline staff have the right dose of the right medication at one of the first points of care can mean safer and more efficient outcomes for patients. This can improve response times as paramedics aren't having to waste valuable time restocking their vehicle. Patients may also not need to be admitted to the Emergency Department resulting in reduced pressures on A&E.





The Welsh Ambulance Service NHS Trust (WAST) have installed Omnicell's automated cabinets at 15 District General Hospital sites and five ambulance stations across Wales. The system provides WAST clinicians with secure, biometric controlled access to the range of prescription only medicines and controlled drugs that are used by the 999 service. Fingerprint login to the system lets ambulance crews select and withdraw their required medicines and then registers the withdrawal against the vehicle call sign. The system provides a national standardised solution across Wales and offers a much greater level of monitoring, control and traceability.



"The new system has greatly improved the safe and secure management of our medicines and offers us a far greater level of control and access. One of the great benefits of the system is the reduction in time it takes to replenish stocks. As we no longer have the administrative burden of recording drug withdrawals by hand, our vehicles and crews are more readily available to respond to 999 calls and spend more time focusing on face-to-face patient care."
